1. About us:

- a. Willamette Valley Genealogical Society (**WVGS**) was formed in 1968 as a non-profit to promote an interest in genealogy by helping others with their research, presenting programs of family history interest, and publishing records of Marion County.
- b. *Membership is free for 2021*. We welcome anyone interested in their family history, especially those just getting started. We publish a monthly newsletter and quarterly bulletin. Membership includes online access to those. We also have publications from other genealogical societies in Oregon and Washington. In a "normal" year we have monthly meetings and programs of genealogical and historical interest.

2. How we help you:

- a. We provide research services for anyone who contacts us. The complete research policy is on our website. The website lays out the policies for doing detailed research and lists the charges for looking up that information. Basically, the cost is \$10 per hour for general research but if there is a request for documents, newspaper articles or other items the charge is \$10 per piece or three for \$20. There is a discount for members when obtaining documents/articles online. (No discount if it involves a trip to OSA, etc.). Research is not limited to Oregon only.
- b. We are a partner with Salem Public Library and maintain a volunteer desk there to provide free help. When we are at the library, we have access to our large collection of 5,000 genealogy and history books, periodicals, and family histories. Our trained volunteers also use computers to visit genealogy websites.
- c. Salem Public Library has access to the Library Edition of ancestry.com, the most popular genealogy website. We also access free sites such as familysearch.org.
- d. WVGS subscribes to newspapers.com and genealogybank.com for obituaries and other newspaper articles, Fold3 for military records,

americanancestors.org for New England research and FamilyTree Magazine. We teach a genealogy class at the Senior Center 50+.

2. Research during a pandemic:

a. All research must be done remotely until Salem Public Library reopens.

- b. Our skilled volunteers can look up census records along with birth, marriage, death, and burial information. In addition, researchers have access to military, immigration, citizenship, family tree and city directory resources and all types of newspaper articles.
- c. Our 5,000 books are in storage at Salem Public Library and not accessible.
- d. We still have our own collection of periodicals and family histories stored at our storage space. The list of our materials is on our website, wvgsor.org under "Materials". The periodicals and family histories can still be accessed by a volunteer.
- e. During the library's closure, we are offering limited free research to residents of Marion and Polk counties. Willamette Valley Genealogical Society is offering either one hour of free research or one newspaper article/obituary per household. This is for residents of Marion and Polk Counties. The results would only be sent by email. Contact us at willvgs@yahoo.com.
- f. If more than one hour of research or more than one news article/obituary is desired, then the research fee policy would apply. Go to the 'Research' page at www.wvgsor.org for more information on our research policy.
- g. Research is not limited to Oregon only.
- h. Ancestry.com is the most popular genealogy site. Salem Public Library is offering access free access to ancestry.com to library patrons during the pandemic! Salem Public Library says "During the closure, our virtual services are still available. These systems require a library card and PIN number for access. Don't have a library card? Death certificate for my grandfather, Charles A Wells, died in Hood River County in May or June 1906. He was killed in an accident building the railroad.

The Hood River News-Letter, the last issue, gives the details of three untimely deaths near that place during the past few days:

Charles Wells, foreman of the powder gang working opposite Menominee on the North Pacific railroad, while tamping a charge of powder for a blast they were preparing, prematurely discharged the shot, receiving the full force of the explosion in his face and breast. He was killed and two of his assistants were slightly injured.

Mr. Wells was nearly 45 years old and leaves a wife and two children.
