Education WHC welcomed 24 school school groups (850 students, and 194 adult chaperones) for on-site field trips, and nine groups (137 visitors) for scheduled group tours.

Zooming Back to History: In 2022, WHC hosted eight speakers for the fourth and fifth seasons of this online speaker series focusing on the history of the Willamette Valley and greater Oregon. As an online series, our guests were able to enjoy speakers from states across the country, such as Oregon, Washington, Nebraska, and California.

• 112 people registered for Zooming Back to History and generated \$5,140.00 in revenue.

Adult Classes: In addition to grant support from Marion Cultural Development Corporation for our new woodworking classes, we were able to expand our class and workshop offerings to also include weaving and food preservation. Special thanks to our class and workshop partners: Salem Fiberarts Guild, Millrace Woodcraft, and Oregon State University.

• 33 adults registered for classes and workshops and generated \$3,830.00 in revenue.

Little Free Library: WHC received grant fudning from the Rotary Club of Salem to build our own "little free library". The books and activities in the library are being used on a daily basis by our friends and neighbors. Thanks to our volunteers, we were able to build the structure to our liking and fill it with history-themed materials.

Rotary Club of Salem Literacy Grant: \$2,000.00.


Signature Events: The Education department strived to return to in-person educational programming in 2022 following the wake of COVID-19. Events such as Spring Break Family Day, Public Archaeology Day, Sheep to Shawl, and Magic at the Mill all featured hands-on activities for the first time since 2019.

• Spring Break Family Day was a smash hit, welcoming 228 guests (children and their families).




Research Services We were able to help with 470 individual requests - furthering scholarship and understanding of our community history.

The Research Library and Archives staff and volunteers continue to provide research services and access to WHC collections material. In keeping with fellow Salem-based reference libraries practices we continue to provide services remotely where possible, but are happy to schedule in-person appointments for specific materials. We continue to digitize and add materials to the research portion of the WHC website to support this effort, such as the Marion County School Districts reference guide and the corresponding centennial publication 100 Years of Education in Marion County, which were added this year.

Collections In keeping with our mission, the WHC continues to care for and provide access to extensive collections of artifacts, documents, photos and books.

Milestones:

Partnered with Willamette University, Oregon Archaeological Society, City of Salem and Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde on a public archaeology project on site. Volunteers spent weekends during late March and April excavating and investigating areas on site associated with the Methodist Parsonage. After processing, materials uncovered will eventually become part of the WHC's permanent collection.

Entered into an agreement with the City of Salem to take over the Salem Online History Site. Working with a student intern, we successfully transferred content from the old platform onto the WHC website. By the Numbers:

54 donations of new material were accepted into the museum's collections, including over 230 items.

607 items were newly catalogued last year! This includes new donations and materials that have never been catalogued before.

1,076 items were inventoried and rehoused by staff and volunteers.

Exhibits We hosted three new changing exhibits in 2022 and made continued to work on our permanent exhibits.

The Song Goes On: Making Music in Salem corresponded with National Make Music Day and featured a wide variety of WHC collections items relating to music in our community — including a big bass drum from Hebel's Cherrybud Boy's Band, Luella Patton Charlton's piano, and a concert poster from a Little Richard concert.

In **Finding Salem's Chinatown(s)** we worked with several partners to challenge myths and put facts, maps, photos, and documents on display illustrating the experiences of Salem's early Chinese American Community.

The new **Pop-Up Gallery Space** was also put to work — as a test try out some of the new interactive features and signage that will eventually be installed in **Caboose 507** after construction of the access ramp is complete.

Permanent Exhibits — Progress is being made on the permanent exhibits intended for **Caboose 507**. Building permits from the City of Salem were approved for the new ADA accessible ramp and



Volunteers are vital to the day-to-day operations of WHC. They do everything from staffing the front desk, data entry, cataloguing artifacts, sewing costumes, demonstrations of blacksmithing, weaving, and other fiberarts, teaching children how to card and spin wool, providing interpretive tours, maintenance projects, special event support, and serving on the Board of Directors.

Number of Volunteers by Service Area




Overall, in 2022, volunteers donated over 8,200 hours of their time to support the WHC. That is equivalent to almost 4 full-time employees, whose labor — according to the Independent Sector's average hourly volunteer rate — is valued at \$245,590.


As of December 31, 2022, WHC had 443 members, 25 of which belong to the Heritage Club (those who give \$1,000 or more annually)
